The Swami Vivekananda Cultural Centre (SVCC) in Dushanbe, Tajikistan, celebrates the historic day with the theme 'Parampara' i.e., continuity of the learning of the rich culture of India. The event featured a variety of cultural performances, including vocal music and a fusion dance combining Tajik folk with Bollywood.

The Nehru Centre, London, UK, hosted a screening of Philippa Frisby's documentary on Mallakhamb, an ancient form of pole yoga, followed by a sitar recital and discussions on the cultural significance of Mallakhamb.

In Sao Paulo, Brazil, the celebrations extended over a fortnight, featuring a diverse range of activities such as painting exhibitions, meditation workshops, and theatrical performances on the Ramayan.

The SVCC in Astana, Kazakhstan, celebrates Foundation Day with cultural fervor. A dazzling performance featuring Indian and Kazakh students in a mesmerizing fusion of Indian classical dances, folk songs, Kazakh dances, and yoga on the theme 'Cultural Confluence - सांस्कृतिकसंगम' was presented.
